
Pratik Sharma Motorscapes





His grandfather, Indra Sharma, was known for his depiction of gods and goddesses, and his father, Charan Sharma, is a noted name in Indian Contemporary Art. He graduated in Product Design from the Raffles Design Institute, Singapore and later went on to study Relief Sculpture at Art Student League, New York. In 2011, Pratik commissioned 12 paintings for the exclusive Audi calendar, and he has been part of art camps and fairs in New York, Hong Kong, Europe and Japan. 





